Have you ever been asked by someone - or asked someone yourself - if you believe the resurrection really happened as written? I've heard many arguments on both sides - and even some from somewhere in the middle - over the years. Lately, I've been thinking that maybe we jump a little too far ahead with that question. Maybe we should be asking "do you believe that resurrection can happen?"

If you Google the definition of "resurrect," the Oxford Dictionary will tell you that it means "to restore (a dead person) to life," or "to revive the practice, use, or memory of (something); bring new vigor to." Those definitions leave space for anything to be resurrected, not just someone who has physically died. Humans whose lives are at rock bottom can be resurrected. Communities and relationships can be resurrected.

The Oxford Dictionary will also tell you that "resurrect" is a verb, an action. Something needs to be resurrecting the human life, the community. But what is that something? It's probably not the snap of your fingers or harnessing lighting to make an electric current a la Frankenstein's monster.

If you ask me, it's not just something but multiple things: it's belief and hope. To borrow from Alcoholics Anonymous, it's the belief that a "power greater than us can restore us to sanity." The belief that we, other people, communities, programs are important and have value. It's hope for a future that is better, the belief that change is possible.

Whether you believe in it literally or figuratively, Jesus' resurrection gives us an example of this. God believes that human life - that our lives - has value, so he sends Jesus, who teaches humanity to believe and hope even beyond his resurrection. Jesus' teachings show us the importance of believing that others matter, of creating community. His death and resurrection show us that there is hope beyond despair, that we, too, may rise out of darkness and death and be given a new life.

So to answer my question above, yes. I believe that resurrection can happen because I've seen it. In the way the lives of those struggling with substance abuse are changed. In the birth of new connections from sharing a meal in the Fellowship Hall.

As we celebrate Easter, I hope you start to notice resurrection in your own life. May you have hope and belief in God's love for you and know that you can be resurrected into new life.


LAFAYETTE URBAN MINISTRY

Join Congress St. and Brown St UMC for lunch on Wednesdays!


Each Wednesday we gather for a casual lunch at Pizza Hut on Farabee Drive in
